

### LAKEWOOD HIGH BOASTS 3 NATIONAL MERIT SEMIFINALISTS, 2 COMMENDED STUDENTS

Lakewood High School seniors Tyler DiLoreto, Jamie Holland and Maddie Oldfield have been named Semifinalists in the 68th annual National Merit Scholarship Corp. competition. This designation recognizes Tyler, Jamie and Maddie as among the top students in the nation. Lakewood High also can boast two Commended Students, seniors Alex Peterson and Lila Wright.

Based on their PSAT score from the 2021-2022 school year, Tyler, Jamie and Maddie join the group of 16,000 Semifinalists across the country. These academic standouts rose to the top of more than 1.6 million students who took the PSAT. Semifinalists represent less than 1% of U. S. high school seniors and are the highest scoring entrants in their state. Semifinalists are designated on a state-representational basis. The number of Semifinalists named in each state is proportional to the state's percentage of the

Each new school year the District celebrates its numerous Lakewood High School students who have earned the designation of AP Scholar by virtue of their scores on the college-level Advanced Placement exams taken in May. This year, we add a special congratulations to 2022 graduate Inga Wilhelmy, who

was one of only 197 students in the world to earn every point possible on the 2-D Art & Design Exam.

"This outstanding accomplishment is likely a direct reflection of the top-quality education being offered at Lakewood High School," said Trevor Packer, head of the Advanced Placement Program. "We applaud

Inga's hard work and the AP teacher responsible for engaging students and enabling them to excel in a college-level course."

Tyler, James, and Madeline are now eligible to continue on in the competition in hopes of being named a Finalist and receiving one of more than 7,500 scholarships worth nearly \$30 million to be awarded in the spring. More than 15,000 of the 16,000 nationwide Semifinalists are expected to advance to the Finalist level, and in February they will be notified of this designation.

National Merit Scholarship Corp. Commended Students are among the top 5% of PSAT scorers. Although Alexander and Lila do not move on in the scholarship competition, we recognize them as among the best students in the state.

### VISION OF A LAKEWOOD GRADUATE FOCUS: NEW LHS AP COURSE

With each Report Card issue, we will highlight how our Vision of a Lakewood Graduate is being incorporated into our classrooms every day. One great example is the new AP African American Studies class at Lakewood High School. The class, which is taught by Austin Sparks, is one of 60 being taught across the country as part of a pilot program. LHS is the only school in Ohio that was selected to take part.

The curriculum stretches from colonization in Africa through the migration and subsequent enslavement in America and through the civil rights movement. The class is a great example of students displaying a growth mindset by digging into a topic that they have not explored before and doing so with an open mind about what they are learning now versus what they may have learned in the past

about African American
history. The curriculum challenges their critical thinking
skills as they learn how what
happened to African American ancestors still resonates
in African American culture
today. By reading original
source documents, students
are able to empathize with
the plight of those who
were trapped, sold and enslaved.
The class also expands students'



global perspective/awareness as they learn about pre-slavery African societies.

tunately some of our families cannot afford to register for Learn-To-Swim (LTS), including our growing refugee population, which also faces language barriers.
