## Niedzwiecki set for shift to Superintendent Office

The 2021-2022 school year will begin with new names, but not new faces in the superintendent and assistant superintendent offices. Current Assistant Superintendent Maggie Niedzwiecki will replace departing Superintendent Mike Barnes, who announced in December that he would leave the District to take over the superintendent job at Mayfield City

Schools, where he spent most of his career.

Niedzwiecki's assistant superintendent position will be filled by the District's current director of teaching and learning, Dr. Christine Palumbo, who has been with the District in two different stints. She spent 14 years as an interventions specialist, left for another district and then in 2011 returned

as the director of student services. In 2016, she was named director of teaching and learning.

The District will be bringing in an educator from the outside to fill Palumbo's position. Steven Ast, the current principal at Brecksville-Broadview Heights High School, will begin his job as the new director of teaching and learning on August 1.

At the time Niedzwiecki's hiring was announced, Board of Education President Betsy Bergen Shaughnessy said, "Maggie brings unique experience that will help us move forward in addressing a Board priority – tackling the learning loss resulting from the impact of the pandemic. Maggie will, in her words, maintain the


## Congrats to Class of 2021!

## District repeats as among best in music education

Lakewood City Schools has once again earned the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education and support from the Lakewood community. Lakewood is one of 686 districts from across the

country and only 46 in Ohio to earn the prestigious award.

The Best Communities for Music Education (BCME) recognizes outstanding efforts of teachers, administrators, parents, students and community leaders who are making music part of a well-rounded education for

every child in their communities. The District answered detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, and support for the music program. This year there were also questions about how our staff adapted instruction dur-

ing remote instruction due to the pandemic.

This award recognizes that our district is leading the way with music learning opportunities and that our Board of Education and community are committed to continuing the excellent legacy of music education in our schools.

#### Students sweep Beck/Rotary speech awards

Contest participants are students from the five Lakewood and Rocky River high schools including Lakewood High School, Lutheran High School West, Magnificat High School, Rocky River High School, and St. Edward High School. The speech contestants were asked apply the principles of Rotary international's Four Way Test to a current ethical issue. Students are challenged to identify a topic they feel passionate about and to

adopt a point of view from which they will seek to persuade others. The Four Way Test includes the questions:

- Is it the truth?
- Is it fair to all concerned?
- Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
- Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

#### Artists selected for Gov. Youth Exhibit

Congratulations to Lakewood High senior Nola Williams-Riseng, whose artwork (pictured) was honored with an Award of Excellence as one of the top 25 pieces entered in the Ohio Governor's Youth Art Exhibit competition. Also earning a spot in



the 300-piece exhibit with their artwork were juniors Grace Hoppel and Inga Wilhelmy.

Judges received more than 1,000 entries from high school students across Northeast Ohio. From those entries, 126 were selected to join winners from the other Ohio regions to be judged at the state level to determine what art to include in the exhibition.

From the 6,000 regional entries from across Ohio, approximately 1,000 are selected to enter the state judging. State jurors then

select 300 for the actual exhibition, with 25 of the 300 chosen to receive the Governor's Award of Excellence. Scholarships are offered to seniors by over 30 universities and colleges of art.

The Ohio Governor's Youth Art Exhibition is open to all Ohio high schools. Its purpose is to provide all young artists of the state with opportunities to advance their talent, whether that be through scholarships or simply experiencing the process of entering their work in a competition.

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## Lakewood Kiwanis donates \$15,000 to District

Part of the tradition of the Lakewood Kiwanis is to have a signature project to mark important anniversaries of the organization. For the group's 75th anniversary in 1996, the Kiwanis gifted an illuminated sign for the Lakewood Board of Education property located then on Warren Road. A quarter century later and in conjunction with its centennial celebration, the Kiwanis have graciously given the Lakewood City Schools \$15,000 to place a new sign at the Board's new home at the Taft Center for Innovation (formerly Taft Elementary).

"We are extremely grateful for the longstanding partnership the District has with the Kiwanis and appreciate the many ways they serve our students, whether it be through scholarships for seniors, service clubs at our school buildings, or now this generous gift for our community," said Superintendent Mike Barnes.

The Kiwanis marked their 100th anniversary with a gala on May 14 where Board President Betsy Bergen Shaughnessy accepted the \$15,000 gift on behalf of the Board.

Kiwanis Centennial Gala chairman and past president Tim Mohr said choosing the schools for the centennial project was a natural fit. "Kiwanis has an ongoing commitment of serving the community through the schools. Our focus has always been on kids," he said.

The District hopes to have the new sign in sometime during the next school year.

## Diversity, equity and inclusion work continues

The District continues to bolster its diversity, equity and inclusion efforts, including concluding its first school year with monthly DEI districtwide task force meetings and professional development focused on DEI at the building levels.

The work continues over the

summer as staff have the option to join a summer reading activity. Staff could select from one of eight titles recommended to read over the summer. There will be book discussions to follow once staff returns in August.

DEI task force members were also invited to participate in a

three-day diversity training in mid-June that was led by CHARP Education Consulting. Other efforts include the continued expansion of books in our libraries that are more reflective of all of our students and the creation of a process to support preferred name and gender in our data systems.
